The Board took under consideration references (a) and (b) in which the Chief of the Bureau of Ships requested reconsideration of the Board's recommendation contained in Report Number 23 tion of the Board's recommendation contained in Report Number 23 dated 6 December; namely, in view of the prospective assignment of one ARS to the Thirteenth Naval District, the Board recommended one against the acquisition of the CASPAR. In view of the changed situation since December 7, 1941, and the lack of any floating salvage facilities in the Alaskan Sector, the Board now recommends that the CASPAR ties in the Alaskan Sector, the Board now recommends that the CASPAR be acquired at the earliest practicable date and assigned to the Naval Salvage Service now in operation under the direction of the Bureau of Ships.
 - 4. The Board next took under consideration reference (c),

which recommended in part as follows:

"....that the vessels indicated below be acquired on bare boat charters when the Bureau of Navigation can furnish crews.

- "(a) TALAMANCA (AF) At present time chartered. Due Norfolk (after limited conversion) about January 17,1942. The Bureau of Navigation is prepared to man this vessel which is destined for the Asiatic Fleet.
- "(b) PASTORES (AF) At present time chartered. Due Norfolk (after limited conversion) about January 21, 1942. This vessel is destined for the Train, U.S. Atlantic Fleet.
- "(c) CALAMARES (AF) At present time chartered. Due to complete limited conversion at New York about January 10, 1942. This vessel is destined for the Base Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet.
- "(d) ANTIQUA (AF) At present time chartered. Due Norfolk after limited conversion) about January 27, 1942. This vessel is destined for the Base Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet.".

The nature and extent of fleet operations under way and in prospect are such that the Board is convinced of the necessity for acquiring the above vessels by bare boat charters and of the need for their assignment as fleet auxiliaries. It is recommended that this be done.

3. The Board took under consideration reference (a) which reviewed the correspondence between the Navy Department and the Maritime Commission on the subject of rescue vessels originally proposed by the Special Naval Observer, London. The Special Naval Observer in London reported that these vessels had been instrumental in saving hundreds of lives and have assisted in inspiring confidence in the convoy system. In addition to rescue work, assistance has been rendered on several occasions to merchant ships requiring medical aid.

The Special Naval Observer recommends also that eleven (11) of these vessels be provided.

- 4. The characteristics desired in these rescue vessels are:
- (a) Sheltered space for 75/100 persons including separate accomodation for rescued officers.
- (b) Sick Bay, with accommodation for a Surgeon and two Pharmacists Mates.
- (c) Cooking and Eating utensils for 75/100 persons in addition to ship's crew.
- (d) Boatage and/or rafts sufficient for crew and 75/100 persons.
- (e) Lower rubbing band (if fitted) to be "blocked in" in the way of after deck, to make a suitable place for boats to get alongside.
- (f) Loud speaker hailing apparatus to be fitted.
- (g) Small and handy boats to be fitted, where not already fitted.
- (h) Empty drums to be stowed in suitable spaces to increase buoyancy.
- (i) Extra crew to be carried for upkeep of additional accommodation and maintenance work and for cooking, etc.
- (j) Distinctive marking for the benefit of ships in convey and for the escort.
- (k) Service respirators to be supplied to the crews of these vessels.
- (1) Provision for the following Naval ratings in addition to merchant service crew:
 - 1 Surgeon
 - 2 Pharmacist Mates
 - 1 Communication Group
 - 10 Armed Guard
- (m) Rescue Baskets and Nets as required.

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- (n) Accommodation for sufficient merchant service wireless operators to enable vessel to keep continuous radio watch. (It is anticipated that with the additional listening apparatus a total of six radio operators will be required).
- (o) Range up to 4,500 miles at convoy speed with a possible speed of 12 knots for a short period.
- (p) Capable of carrying extra fuel and water for this range.
- (q) Stores and clothing for survivors.
- (r) Full scale of merchant ship defensive equipment.
- 4. The Board was informed that the Maritime Commission now has on hand a proprietary design for a wooden ship which substantially meets the above characteristics; but that the Maritime Commission has neither funds nor facilities to undertake the building of these vessels at the present time; that the building of these vessels in accordance with the proprietary design now in the hands of the Maritime Commission would not have a deleterious effect upon the overall ship building program.
- 5. In Report Number 19 the Board recommended that the Department officially record its approval for the necessity of these vessels and that the Maritime Commission be so advised. The recommendation was approved by the Secretary of Navy in reference (c). The Board now recommends that the proprietary design for these rescue vessels be obtained from the Maritime Commission and that the Bureau of Ships build eleven (11). The question of whether these vessels are to be manned by civilian or Navy crews should be left open for determination when the building has progressed sufficiently to indicate the necessity for manning.



- 3. The Board took under consideration reference (a) which recommended that measures be taken to construct two cable repair ships. From information available to the Board, it appears that the Navy Department's interest in the subject matter of reference (a) derives from the importance of maintaining trans-Atlantic cables. These cables are privately owned and operated and there are now an adequate number of privately owned cable repair ships for maintenance. The immediate concern is caused by a request of the British Admiralty for release of the cable ship JOHN W. MACKAY from Halifax for operations elsewhere desired by the British. The JOHN W. MACKAY is American owned and operating under British registry.
- 4. The Board expresses no opinion as to whether or not two cable ships should be constructed; but, after careful consideration of the Navy's overall needs and the projected building and conversion program to fill them, recommends against the inclusion of two cable repair ships.

- The Board took under consideration reference (a), which recommended that either a seatrain or other suitable vessel be acquired and converted for the primary purpose of rapid transportation of motor torpedo boats, armament and equipment to points where their services are required. The Board considered that the remaining seatrains are now engaged in useful service and their acquisition for special transportation is not recommended. The Board considered that motor torpedo boats can be transported on deck of tankers and auxiliaries. Although it is known that not more than six motor torpedo boats can be carried on a ship of this type, this is believed to be an advantage because if the ship is attacked, a minimum of motor torpedo boats would be lost.
- The Board recommends against the acquisition of any vessels for the primary purpose of transporting motor torpedo W.S. FARBER.

- 2. The Board took cognizance of the fact that the NANCY LYKES had been acquired for use as a replacement for USS POLLUX. The Board recommends that only a limited conversion be made at the present time for use as a stores issue ship (AKS) and the conversion be limited in extent to that which can be accomplished during the time necessary for the installation of the defense items.
- 3. The Board recommends the acquisition by purchase of a suitable 10-1/2 knot tanker of approximately 80,000 barrel capacity to meet the immediate Naval demand for a tanker of these characteristics.
- 4. The Board further took under consideration reference (a), paragraph 2(c), which recommended that investigation be made to meet the possibility of providing Boat Accommodation Ships. Due to the urgent need for ships of all types to meet immediate wartime requirements, the Board considers that, to acquire or divert a ship for this purpose at this time, is not justified. The Board considers that sufficient boats can be transported on decks of tankers and other auxiliaries to provide the necessary service to fleet units.

- The Board was informed that the PRESIDENT MADISON was available for acquisition by the Navy and took cognizance of the urgent need for additional transports. It is recommended, therefore, that the PRESIDENT MADISON be acquired on bare boat charter, that she be converted to a convoy loaded transport (AP) and that this conversion be limited at this time to the minimum necessary for use as a transport. After inspection by the Bureau of Ships and consultation between the representatives of the Bureau of Ships and the Vice Chief of Naval Operations, if it is determined that the vessel is suitable for conversion to a Transport for Evacuation of Wounded (APH), the Board will make further recommendation in the premises.
- The Board's attention was called to reference (a), which requests that consideration be given to the question of providing tenders for the Fleet Winesweepers (AM) now building. The Board was informed that

the minesweepers in numbers would not be ready for service until late in 1942. The Board considers that the immediate needs for these tenders is not urgent. Due to the fact that there is an acute shipping shortage at present, the Board recommends that no vessel be designated or acquired for conversion at this time. The Board further recommends that the Bureau of Ships make an investigation and study of the possibility of converting one or more of these minesweepers to tenders for the class.

- The Board next considered reference (b) which stated that the Bureau of Ships had been informed that the Maritime Commission was prepared to include in the SS DELORLEANS and SS DELARGENTINO, Maritime Commission Hulls 151 and 152, while building, Navy features for combat loaded transports (AP's). It is recommended that the DELORLEANS and DELARGENTINO be purchased for conversion to combat loaded AP's for the Navy. The Board was informed that the ALCOA COURIER, ALCOA CORSAIR and ALCOA CRUISER, Maritime Commission Hulls 175, 176 and 177, were having APH features included while building at the Moore Drydock, Oakland, California. The Board recommends that two of these ALCOA vessels be acquired by purchase and recommends that these two ships replace the PRESIDENT TAHLOR, previously authorized as an APH in Auxiliary Vessels' Board Report No. 17, and if these two ships are acquired, that the PRESIDENT MADISON be not converted to an APH as considered in Auxiliary Vessels' Board Report No. 38.
- 4. The Board recommends that the following vessels be acquired by bare boat charter: SS BLUE SUNOCO, SS FLYING A, SS GEORGE HENRY, SS TYPE and SS THOS. JEFFERSON, and that these vessels be manned by Navy crews. It is not considered necessary that any conversion work be undertaken other than essential defense features.
- 5. In Auxiliary Vessels' Board Report No. 38, the Board recommended that the PRESIDENT MADISON be acquired by the Navy on bare boat charter and that she be converted to convoy loaded AP. Upon inspection by representatives of the Bureau of Ships, the report of her poor material condition which the agents refuse to correct, the Board now recommends that the PRESIDENT MADISON be acquired by purchase, in view of the expense of conversion and in view of the benefits which will accrue to the Government through outright ownership.
- of the Board took official cognizance of the desirability of acquiring the following vessels SS AZTEC, SS MAYA, SS TOLTEC, SS MUSA and SS FLATONA. The Board considers that the characteristics of this vessel, namely side loading ports, arrangement of compartments, and inadaptability to ready installation of gun foundations, do not permit conversion to a combination passenger and carge ship without extensive and costly alterations. The Board recommends, therefore, that the CHEROKEE not be acquired. It is

considered that the USS STRATFORD (AP41), which has proven to be unsuitable for the Iceland duty for which she was procured, would meet most of the needs pointed out for the intended use of the CHEROKEE.

- The Beard recommends that in view of the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific Fleet's orders cancelling the mission for which the SS THOMAS JEFFER-FERSON was originally intended, that the acquisition of the THOMAS JEFFER-SON, as approved in Report No. 40, be cancelled. The Board notes that the vessel is to be returned to the War Shipping Administration in accordance with the Vice Chief of Naval Operations' letter of April 13, 1942, serial 57139.
- which the Commander Western Sea Frontier requested that the ex-Ferryboat CITY OF SACRAMENTO be acquired for use with that force as a seaplane tender. This contemplated construction program will still leave a deficiency of two vessels in the 1943 conversion program, namely, one (1) Submarine Tender (AS) and one (1) Repair Ship (AR).

- 5. In order to meet this deficiency it is recommended that two C-3 type vessels be acquired by purchase through the War Shipping Administration and be manned by Navy crews, one of these vessels to be converted to a Repair Ship (AR) and one to be converted to a Submarine Tender (AS). It has been brought to the attention of the Board that two C-3 type vessels, the SS HAWAIIAN PLANTER and the SS HAWAIIAN MERCHANT may be immediately available for this purpose.
- 6. By references (b) and (c), it has been brought to the attention of the Board that the SS JOSEPH R. PARROTT and SS ESTRADA PAIMA are available for acquisition, are in satisfactory material condition and are of characteristics suitable for conversion to minelayers (CM). In view of the urgent need for additional minelayers at this time and in the future, it is recommended that these two ships be acquired by purchase, manned by Navy crews, and that they be converted as soon as practicable to minelayers, incorporating the minimum conversion features.
- 7. The Board then took under consideration the request of Commander Service Force, Atlantic Fleet, reference (d), which requested the acquisition of the following type ships to be manned by Navy crews for assignment to that Force:
 - "(a) 6 AO's similar in type to the CHICOPEE or the SALAMONIE.
 - (b) 6 AK's similar in type to the ARCTURUS.
 - (c) 4 AF's similar in type to the MIZAR or TARAZED."

The Board, after investigation, has determined that there are no ships of the desired types at present available for acquisition by the Navy which are not now allocated to useful wartime service. From the number of vessels requested it is the opinion of the Board that the transportation of the logistic support of all bases in the Atlantic is contemplated. It has been pointed out to the Board that the shipping situation at present is so critical that the War Shipping Administration is reluctant to give the Navy any vessel for the operation of carrying cargo to bases near our coasts when these bases could be supplied by available commercial vessels. Under





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- The Commander-in-Chief, United States Fleet, requested in reference (a) that twenty (20) vessels suitable for use as small transports and utility cargo carriers be acquired during 1942-1943: five (5) immediately, ten (10) within six months, and five (5) in 1943. The Board made a study of all suitable ships which were available or building, and recommended, in reference (b), the acquisition by purchase of five (5) lumber schooners to meet the immediate need and of fifteen (15) ALGERINE type minesweepers, now building in Canadian shipyards, five (5) of which are scheduled for completion prior to January 1, 1943, for conversion to small transports and utility cargo carriers. This report was approved by the Secretary of the Navy on April 6, 1942. It is the understanding of the Board that the negotiations for the purchase of these ships are practically completed. In order to provide the number required within six months and to complete the program, the Board recommended, in reference (c), that fourteen (14) of the diesel-propelled (250' N3-M-A1) cargo vessels now being built for the British under Lend-Lease by the Maritime Commission be acquired for this purpose. This report was approved by the Secretary of the Navy on April 14, 1942. The Board has been informed that the delivery dates of these cargo vessels are as follows: three (3) prior to January 1, 1943, and the remaining eleven (11) during 1943.
 - 4. The Board's attention was called to the fact that in view of changed conditions and the pressing need for additional mine-sweepers, the Commander-in-Chief, United States Fleet, desires that the fifteen (15) AIGERINE type minesweepers be completed as such. The Board, therefore, recommends that these ships be completed as minesweepers, and that sound gear and depth charge racks be installed while building.

The Board recommends, therefore, that the MALANTIC, LARRANAGA, EL COSTON, and MANA be acquired on bare boat charter from the War Shipping Administration, be given the minimum conversion necessary to continue them in operating service as Cargo Vessels (AK), and be manned by Navy (Coast Guard) crews.

7. In reference (e) the Commandant, Twelfth Naval District recommends the acquisition of the ex-ferryboat FORT SUTTER for a floating barracks in the San Francisco Bay Area. It is stated that there is an urgent need for an additional floating barracks suitable for housing crews of vessels undergoing extensive repairs and conversion in the Bay Area, and especially in view of the impending release of the ferryboat, S.S. HAIWARD, now loaned to the Navy for that purpose. Considering the low expense and advantage of mobility of a floating barracks relative to a stationary shore barracks in that Area, the Board recommends that the FORT SUTTER be acquired by requisition purchase, and that it be given the minimum conversion to a floating barracks.

The Commandant, Fourteenth Naval District, requests in references (a) and (b) the acquisition of the hulk MAUNA LOA (220,183) for use as a Barracks Ship in the Hawaiian Area, and it is stated in reference (c) that the War Shipping Administration has approved verbally of the request. The Board recommends that the MAUNA LOA be acquired by requisition purchase from the War Shipping Administration, and that it be converted to a nonself-propelled Barracks Ship, to be classed as a Houseboat (YHB), for use in the Hawaiian Area in accordance with references (a), (b), and (c).

pective movements overseas of U. S. troops. Of those listed the U.S.A.T. ANCON, U.S.A.T. HUGH L. SCOTT, and U.S.A.T. TASKER H. BLISS are Army owned. The S.S. SANTA LUCIA, S.S. EXEMPLAR, S.S. SANTA CLARA, S.S. MORMACSUN, S.S. MORMACSTAR, and S.S. MONTEREY (Official No. 232,021) are owned or chartered by the War Shipping Administration. The GOETHAIS (Bataan) is now under construction by the Maritime Commission for the Army. It was brought to the attention of the Board that the last-named ship would not be completed in time for this movement and with the concurrence of the representatives of the Army and the Commander-in-Chief present at the meeting, the S. S. MORMACTIDE is substituted as a replacement for this vessel.

- The Board recommends that steps be taken to acquire for Navy use through transfer by the Army to Navy account the following ships: U.S.A.T. ANCON, U.S.A.T. HUGH L. SCOTT, U.S.A.T. TASKER H. BLISS; that the Navy acquire from the War Shipping Administration, by purchase or bare boat charter, whichever may be most advantageous to the Government, the following ships: S.S. SANTA LUCIA, S.S. MORMACTIDE, S.S. SANTA CLARA, S.S. MORMACSUN. S.S. MORMACSTAR, S.S. MONTEREY, and S.S. EXEMPLAR, or a like number of similar ships in case these are not readily available; and that when acquired these ships be Navy manned and converted to modified combat loaded transports. For the conversion of these vessels, it is recommended that provision be made for carrying the maximum number of landing boats and tank lighters, this to include adequate fuel stowage for the equipment provided, and the accomplishment of such other characteristic conversion features as may be applicable on a not-to-delay basis.
- 5. The Board understands that the conversions of the S.S. MORMACTIDE, S.S. MORMACSUN, S.S. MORMACSTAR and S.S EXEMPLAR will be accomplished by the Army and paid for by the Army. The Board was informed that Naval Personnel would be given full access to these ships while undergoing conversion but to avoid legal complications which may arise as to responsibility for these ships, the details of the conversion and the financial arrangements for the payment of conversion costs, it is recommended that they not be acquired and commissioned in the Navy until the major conversion features are complete. - 7. As conversions should be completed within thirty days after arrival of the ships at the conversion yards or as soon thereafter as practicable it is recommended that the priority for this work be the same as now assigned the building of all amphibious craft.
- 8. In order to expedite and facilitate the foregoing, it is further recommended that the classification of all correspondence with reference thereto, which will not divulge the general nature of this movement, be made CONFIDENTIAL and not SECRET.



- 3. The Board took under consideration the references listed relative to the acquisition of additional tankers for fleet use.
- 4. With the rapid increase in the number of Naval ships now being placed in service and contemplated, the vast expanse of operating areas, the wide dispersion of fleet units and the urgent need for ample fuel supply, the building and acquisition of tankers



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has not kept pace with the increasing demands for their services and, as a result, the number of Navy tankers is short of present and prospective needs. In this connection the Board's attention was called to the directive creating the Army-Navy Petroleum Board which states that the Navy shall be responsible for procuring and operating such tankers as are required solely for the movement of cargoes of Army and/or Navy petroleum supplies. Tankers now owned or chartered by the Army will continue to be operated by the Army under Navy movement control.

- tankers are from those now building by the Maritime Commission and a limited number being built for private account. After a careful study of the Maritime Commission's building program now under way and contemplated, the Board considers that the Navy should be given precedence in the acquisition of these tankers as a paramount wartime measure.
- 6. The Board, therefore, strongly recommends that the Navy acquire by purchase through the War Shipping Administration twenty-four (24) tankers now building. These tankers should have a minimum speed of 14.5 knots and a deadweight tonnage not less than 16,000 tons. Certain conversion work will be necessary, the main items being installation of fueling-at-sea gear, installation of armament and an increase in personnel accommodations for Navy crews.
- of these vessels should be accomplished by the Navy. In order that a uniform program of conversion may be established and the orderly procurement and assembly of materials be effected with a view to advancing the ultimate dates these ships will be placed in service, the Board further recommends that these ships be delivered to the Navy prior to completion of such features as will require alteration for suitable Naval service and that deliveries be made at the rate of two a month beginning in August, 1942.
- 8. The following tankers now building or similar ones of their type are recommended for acquisition as the most suitable for Naval use. The advantage of a single standard type is recognized but in accordance with the expressed desires of the Commander-in-Chief for tankers of greater speed, several types necessarily are listed to make up the required number:

- The Board recommends that the SS MORMACYORK (241,993) and the SS DELSANTOS (240,294) be acquired on bare boat charter through the War Shipping Administration, that the transfer be made on September 12, that the ships be manned by Navy crews, and that the maximum additional conversion be accomplished prior to the time these vessels are required.
- As requested by the War Department in reference (c), the Board, in reference (d), recommended that three (3) EC-2-S-Cl type hulls be acquired from the Maritime Commission for the United States Army, be converted by the Navy and operated as hospital ships (AH) in accordance with the terms of the Geneva convention. 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- As directed by the Commander-in-Chief, United States Fleet, in his memorandum endorsement to reference (a), the Board considered reference (b) in which the Commander South Pacific Force urgently requested that ten (10) EC-2 type hull ships be acquired at the earliest possible date, be given a minimum conversion, and be manned by Navy crews for use in the logistic support of certain forces in the area under his command. This service is presently being performed by cargo ships of the Transport Command and these latter ships will not continue to be available for that purpose because of their prospective employment in connection with offensive operations elsewhere. The Board considers it essential to the prosecution of the war that the Commander South Pacific Force be provided with these ships at the earliest practicable time, and therefore, they should be acquired from hulls being built in the San Francisco area. A study of the Maritime Commission building program in this area discloses that from those building there will be available for acquisition ten (10) EC-2 type hulls which are due for completion at the rate of three each month, beginning early in October. Three a month is the maximum rate at which the Bureau of Naval Personnel will be able to man these ships.
- 4. The Board recommends that ten (10) EC-2 type hulls building in the San Francisco area be acquired by bare boat charter or purchase, whichever is more advantageous to the Navy, at the average rate of one every ten days, beginning at the earliest date practicable; that the minimum conversion be accomplished to provide for their use as cargo ships (AK) and to accommodate a Navy crew of sufficient number to efficiently operate the ships and man the standard battery installed.
- mended that the Navy acquire for use as small troop transports fourteen (14) of the fifty (50) 250 N3-M-Al cargo vessels being built at the Penn-Jersey Shipbuilding Company by the Maritime Commission for the British under Lend-Lease. The Board's attention was called to reference (a) in which the Commander-in-Chief, United States Fleet, stated that planned operations in the South Pacific and Southwest Pacific urgently require a number of small tankers which are not obtainable from normal sources. The Board has ascertained that there are 28 suitable type tankers presently being built by the Maritime Commission under Lend-Lease for the United Kingdom, classed as Tl-M-Al.

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4. The Board considers that six of these vessels are essential at this time to operations in the areas mentioned and recommends that they be acquired by the Navy from the twenty-eight (28) tankers (Tl-M-Al) being built by the Maritime Commission under Lend-Lease for the United Kingdom. Because of the completion dates, the convenient location of the building yards and the urgency of need, the following are most desirable to the United States Navy:

The Board further recommends that following acquisition of these vessels by the Navy they be converted to provide for Navy crews and to permit the transportation or storage of both gasoline and diesel oil.

5. It has been brought to the attention of the Board that the Fuel Oil Barge ERSKINE M. PHELPS, capacity approximately 30,000 barrels, is in good material condition and available to and needed by the Navy. The Board recommends that this vessel be purchased by the Navy at the earliest practicable date and be classed as a Fuel Oil Barge (YO).

- 3. Upon request by Commander Service Force, Pacific Fleet, in reference (a), the Board, in reference (b), recommended the acquisition of six concrete fuel carrying barges now being built on the Pacific Coast. In reference (c), Commander Service Force, Pacific Fleet, requested six additional barges of the type referred to above.
- 4. The Board considers there is an urgent need for six additional (a total of twelve) barges to meet an expanding fuel storage requirement of the Naval forces in the South Pacific. The barges referred to in paragraph 3 are the only barges available and are readily suitable after conversion to meet this urgent need. They are so designed that they can be towed to the required locations and anchored as fuel storage, thereby releasing tankers for continuous transport.
- 5. The Board recommends that Type B7-Al concrete barges, Maritime Commission Hull numbers 1221 to 1226, inclusive, now building by the Concrete Ship Constructors, National City, California, for the War Shipping Administration, be purchased by the Navy; that a minimum conversion be undertaken to accommodate Navy crews; and that provision be made for carrying one product, fuel oil, in three of the barges, and two products, diesel oil and gasoline, in the other three.
- 6. In reference (d), the Commandant, Naval Operating Base, Argentia, advised that the S/S RICHARD PECK, a passenger vessel, had served its usefulness at Argentia and was available for transfer to other duty. In reference (e), the Commandant, Fifth Naval District, requested the S/S STEEL PIER be purchased and converted for use in the transportation of personnel in Chesapeake Bay. The Board considers that the S/S STEEL PIER is in such a poor material condition that an unjustifiable amount of critical material and labor, and expense would be required to fit her for any use whatsoever. These ships are similar in characteristics and the Board considers that the S/S RICHARD PECK can be substituted to meet the needs of the Commandant, Fifth Naval District. The Board, therefore, recommends against the acquisition of the S/S STEEL PIER.
- 7. The War Shipping Administration has suggested that the BRIDGEPORT (formerly U.S.S. BRIDGEPORT (AR2)) after the conversion now being accomplished by the War Shipping Administration be manned by a Navy crew for use as a station ship in a Caribbean port, primarily to repair merchant ships, but in addition to augment the Navy repair facilities.

8. The Board considers that the manning of the BRIDGEPORT by a Navy crew and the command of that ship by the Navy would be advantageous to the war effort and, therefore, recommends that the BRIDGEPORT be acquired by assignment of title to the Navy for the uses above stated.


